# TRA Ltd PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The most striking thing that hit me between the eyes when I returned to shooting was the dramatic decline in shooter numbers.

When I "took a holiday" in the mid-'80s (business unfortunately interfered with pleasure), there were about 12,000 registered smallbore and air rifle shooters. Now, we barely scrape over 2,000.

The TRA board has as a central objective a return to at least 10,000 shooters by 2016.

But this won't happen until we at first understand the reasons for the loss of membership. There are undoubtedly several reasons.

The first to spring to mind is the restrictive legislation that faces us today, but most people have adapted to the difficulties so I won't dwell on this issue for the moment.

One issue that came up several times as I canvassed both State Associations and individuals was the part played by our targets.

There is a fair amount of anecdotal evidence to support the view that as target sizes (ie the scoring rings) have shrunk, so have our member numbers.

Certainly, I'm old enough to remember the so-called "yardage targets", and the mass exodus of shooters when we changed over to the much harder metric targets.

Similarly, I'm told that when we reduced the size of the bull from 12.0 mm to 10.4 mm, scores plummeted and so did shooter numbers.

If there is in fact cause and effect happening here, we can conclude that shooters like to have a bit of success from time to time.

Everyone does, so we're not much different to everybody else. While we can't all be Australian Champions, we can at least go home occasionally with a "possible" on our scorecard.

Basking in the warm glow of our own special achievement, we receive what psychologists call positive reinforcement. And we keep shooting.

# Club View ----- MANUWATU SMALLBORE RIFLE



With a number of Australian shooters heading to New Zealand for the 2012 TRNZ National Championships, it was thought that you might like to know a little about where you're heading.

The Manawatu Smallbore Rifle Association (MSRA) is a combination of all the seven smallbore rifle clubs in the Manawatu and Rongotea shoot at the Totara Road Range in Palmerston North, while Aokautere, Awahuri, Bulls, Colyton and Marton shoot at their own ranges.

The Totora Road Range in Palmerston North is the home range for Manawatu Smallbore Rifle Association. This range also hosts the North Island Open and Air Championships annually.

### HISTORY...

Miniature rifle shooting became popular in the early 1900s. Over the years volunteer rifle units had functioned mainly under their own leadership, being coordinated by the NZ Government.

On deciding to form a defense corp, various forms of shooting were introduced with cadet and territorial units. One of the most popular types resulted when a lightweight rifle consisting of a Morris 22 calibre tube was fitted to a standard Lee Enfield stock. This rifle, being light and easily handled, was popular with the younger cadets in early competitions when the sport gradually became known as miniature rifle shooting.

Shooting stagnated until 1920 when a surge of popularity saw more clubs established. Ideas and suggestions for a more formal style of competition had been mooted for some time as neighboring associations had been formed at Wellington and Wanganui. As a result of these discussions, the Linton Club instigated a meeting to be held at Rongotea on the 1st of May, 1924.

As a result of these meetings, matches organized for the first year of competition were the Cliffe and Remington Cup to be fired under the postal system, and the McKelvie Cup matches whose conditions had been changed from a challenge cup to a series of round robin matches shot under travelling conditions.

Both were to be contested by teams of 10 men over 2 rounds. Several postal matches were later arranged with the Wellington Association where a team, consisting of the holders of the 20 highest aggregates in the Association were selected, resulting in a win and a loss to each team.

### THESE DAYS...

The Manawatu 50m Outdoor club shoot at the Rifle Rod and Gun Club range, Turitea. The 50 metre prone and 3P events are shot outdoors with .22 calibre smallbore rifles.

The association now has a strong member base, and performs consistently amongst the best in New Zealand. Manawatu will be hosting the 2012 Outdoor Smallbore Nationals from 17-25 February.

If you are going—have fun, and may the 10s be with you.



# Club View— Shooting in Malaysia



### **Brief History of Shooting**

Shooting took root in Malaya in 1903. But shooting could hardly be described as a sport then as it was organized in ad hoc manner.

Even the competitions organised then, the Hannigan Shield and Warren Shield, were confined to police personnel. It was unheard of for civilians to take part in police competitions at the turn of the century. It took a long 22 years before shooting was introduced to civilians when the Penang Free School's cadets became the exclusive ones to try out the sport and given proper shooting training in 1925.

As the sport grew in popularity, shooting enthusiasts, especially police personnel, felt there was a need to organise proper Inter-State competitions. Thus the birth of the Osborne Shield in 1930 The proliferation of interest led to the construction of makeshift shooting range at the Wardiburn Camp in Setapak, Kuala Lumpur where some British units were stationed in the late forties and fifties.

Interest for the sport soon gathered momentum with the new Wardiburn Camp and a group of locals, led by the late Tan Sri S.M. Yong, formed a legitimate shooting association, now known as the Selangor Shooting Association (SSA), in 1948.

Today, National Shooting Association of Malaya stands as a progressive, visionary and dynamic association, offering a comprehensive range of shooting facilities and holding regular competitions for national youth and senior shooters. It has also organised numerous international shooting championships such as the Sea Games, SEASA, Asian Shooting Championships and the Commonwealth Games.

The Subang Shooting Range has undergone tremendous changes, so much so that one, who has last visited it just three years ago, won't be able to recognise it.

The group had a varied mix of score levels with the highest being 593, shot on a couple of occasions, with 393 from both girls. The biggest news however




coming back from Europe is the new electronic targets that are now available.

# **MENTAL MANAGEMENT SYSTEMS**

The idea of a new year brings out our desire to become better. We set resolutions and pursue new goals and dream a little about how this year will be different. We will try something new, step outside of our comfort zone, break down our walls and become a better version of ourselves.

This year will also be a great year for Mental Management. This year marks several anniversaries for us. 40 years ago Lanny Bassham had a mental failure in his first Olympic Games which started his thirst for knowledge on mental control and the reason we are in business today. 35 years ago Lanny and Helen Bassham founded Mental Management Systems and Lanny started teaching his system to competitors.

Since January is all about goals and becoming better we have decided to tell you how "With Winning in Mind" came to be, the struggles behind Lanny's hesitation to write and the knowledge he learned from his mentor who helped him along the pathway to his goal of being an author.

### From Lanny...

"I wrote an essay for a class in high school and up to this point I thought I was an okay writer. For this particular project I spent extra time, put thought into the paper and was proud of what I presented. After receiving a "D" on the assignment I had worked so hard on, I asked the teacher "Why did I get such a low grade on this paper?" I don't remember the words she spoke exactly but what I heard her to say was "Lanny, you just can't write!" I allowed myself to believe that this statement was true about me. "I'm not a good writer" was my Self-Image and it stayed that way for years. That one comment lead me to believe I was not capable of success with a pen. I could talk, I could shoot but I couldn't write.

In college I dodged every writing course. I didn't want to fail so why try? I chose to major in Business because the writing workload was less than other majors I considered pursuing. In all honesty I really majored in Rifle Shooting but got a degree in Business if you know what I mean. I went to school to get out, not to learn the first time around. I didn't push myself to become a better writer. I didn't challenge myself. I accepted that I couldn't write and moved on with my life."

Advance many years to 1977 and the start of this company. Every student I would teach would ask me if I had a book they could purchase. Every time I turned around someone was wanting material they could take home....A BOOK. A Book? I couldn't even write an essay or an article much less a complete book! After a decade of dodging writing again I couldn't help myself and I told someone I was writing a book. I had a deadline, now I was stuck. I had no choice but to write!

Fortunately, I had a friend who was an editor who offered to teach me to write. He knew my fears of writing and that my Self-Image as an author was super poor. He began to meet with me weekly and help me write my book on his word processor. For those of you young folks this was more like a typewriter than a computer, no internal memory.

I learned so much about myself through this process and after many months it was done.

My last meeting with him was near and I was oozing with excitement! I could see the light at the end of the tunnel. He stood before me holding a floppy disc (do you remember when discs could flop?) and he said "Lanny, this is the only copy of your book. It's right here in my hands. I'm going to do you a favor." He took the disc and threw it into the fire! True story.

The only copy of my book that took months to write was burning in his fireplace. I thought he had to be kidding but he wasn't. He looked at me with complete confidence and said "Nobody's first book is ever any good, go write your book. But this time keep it short, no one wants to read more than 200 pages. And write about people you know. Write more like you talk and make it easy to read. This will help the reader better connect to your content and retain the information."

Frustrated and defeated I turned to leave. Taking his advice, I re-wrote the book and "With Winning in Mind" was born. The original version was published in 1988. I revised the book 1996 and revised it once again last year which is our new Hardcover edition.


So what did I learn through this process that may help you in the journey to obtaining your 2012 goals? I learned:

You need good mentors to help you when pursuing new goals. Mentors provide more than just inspiration and motivation, in my case my mentor helped me to develop the skills necessary to succeed in writing my book. He helped me to believe it was doable. He gave me valuable information and guidance. But most importantly, he didn't just tell me what I wanted to hear and allow my first draft to be enough. He knew I was capable of more and pushed me to be my best.

**You need a timeline.** I hadn't written a book sooner because I didn't have a date of when it had to be finished. It was just a wish. By having a deadline I forced myself to find solutions to completing the book in order to keep my word.

**Never allow someone's negative opinion of you to define you.** I listened to that teacher and allowed her opinion of my writing ability to determine my belief in my ability to write keeping me from pursuing writing in college. I firmly believe that if I had challenged myself to take journalism classes in college I would have 20 books by now.

Go for your goals this year. Find a mentor. Set a deadline. And don't let anyone's opinion matter more than yours!

But if, where a few years ago we could ring up a few possibles, we now struggle to score 96, then positive turns to negative. And if you feel that you're going backwards, then disillusionment inevitably follows.

The TRA board has been looking at developing a new National Target that addresses the problem. This is not all that revolutionary.

Many countries have their own national targets used in parallel to the ISSF targets, with great success. Essentially, they are saying that the tough ISSF targets are OK for the elite shooters, but everyone else can enjoy their sport more with targets that are a bit more friendly.

This column does not allow me to go into all the detail of our thinking, but I will do this via a separate article. In the meantime, I would very much welcome feedback on the concept. That is, I'd like your thoughts on the matter.
